

If you have been convicted of a crime, you still have the right to vote!

- If you have been convicted of a misdemeanor, **you have the right to vote**, even if you are incarcerated.
- If you have been arrested for a felony but have not been convicted, **you still have the right to vote**.
- If you have been convicted of a felony, you may not vote while incarcerated. Once you are out of prison or jail, you **must** re-register to vote, even if you were previously registered. **You have the right to vote.**
- If you live in a halfway house, are on house arrest or any sort of correctional control that does not involve a jail term, **you have the right to vote**.
- If you are on parole, or probation for a felony that does not involve a jail term, **you have the right to vote**.

For voters currently incarcerated

Perhaps the easiest form of ID for incarcerated individuals is the last four digits of your social security number, as that is often used for identification in jail.

Incarcerated individuals must register at their permanent address, not at the jail.

Registration

You must be registered to vote 30 days before Election Day in order to vote. The deadline is October 11, 2016.

You can obtain voter registration forms at your county board of elections, www.myohiovote.com, Ohio Bureau of Motor Vehicles offices, and public libraries.

Identification

You can also use a photo ID card with your name and address, a U.S. military ID card, and any other ID document that shows your name *and* current address (a copy of a current utility bill, a cell phone bill, bank statement, paycheck, or government check).

Absentee Ballot

You can obtain an absentee ballot request form online at www.myohiovote.com or by calling your county board of elections.

Voters who wish to register to vote and cast an absentee ballot must provide either the last four digits of their social security number, Ohio driver's license or state ID number, or a copy of your utility bill or any other document that has your name and address.

Completed absentee ballots must be postmarked by the day before Election Day.
