Public records laws are an invaluable tool for activists. **Don't let them go unused.**

KEEP AN EYE ON YOUR GOVERNMENT

AT A GLANCE:

- Ohio's laws are called public/open records laws or sunshine laws. You can request documents from state and local agencies, including jails, city councils, school boards, and the prison system.
- Federal agencies are covered by the Freedom of Information Act (FOIA). Court records are generally available under the Rules of Superintendence for the Courts of Ohio.
- You can send a request, whether or not you are a resident of that municipality or a citizen.
- Common exceptions include medical records, personnel records, and active law enforcement investigations.
- If you feel that a court has wrongfully withheld records from you, you can file a complaint and petition for writ of mandamus.
