Upon request from the holder of a permit, it shall be canceled, but in the case of any permit or lease, any equipment or buildings owned by the permittee or lessee shall be held as security by the director of natural resources for payment of all rentals or royalties due the state at the time of cancellation.

- (B) The director of natural resources shall not issue any permit or make any lease under division (A) of this section to take or remove oil or natural gas from and under the bed of Lake Erie.
- (C) No person shall remove sand, gravel, stone, or other minerals or substances from and under the bed of Lake Erie without first obtaining a permit or lease therefor from the director.
- (D) The director of natural resources may, in accordance with Chapter 119. of the Revised Code, adopt, amend, and rescind rules for the administration, implementation, and enforcement of this section.

Although we support the provisions of Substitute House Bill 234 as passed by the House, as well as the amendments adopted by the Senate that allow no-fault, no-excuse absentee voting, we protest the decision of the Ohio House to concur with HB 234 because:

- 1. As passed by the Senate, HB 234 violates the Article II, Section 15(D) of the Ohio Constitution, which provides, in pertinent part, "No bill shall contain more than one subject."
- 2. Senate amendments to HB 234 unfairly and perhaps unlawfully burdens the right to vote by requiring absentee voters to produce identification which they may not have;

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3. The timing of the vote on HB 234, less than three weeks before Ohio voters will be asked to amend the Constitution to include a substantially similar proposal, appears to be calculated to undermine voter support for the ballot initiative.

We are pleased that the Ohio House of Representatives has finally adopted a measure to allow no-fault, no excuse absentee voting. We simply protest the undue burdens on voting and the process.
